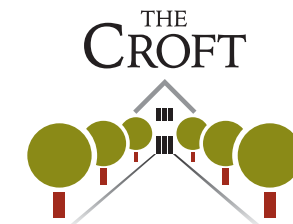

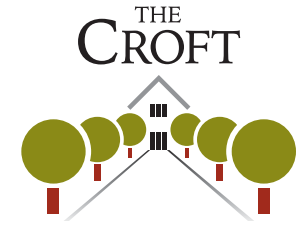
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The Rawnsley is named after Thomas Rawnsley (1755-1826) who was a Woolstapler (English wool was supplied by a stapler and the staple is the length of one fibre when pulled out of the fleece) and Fellmonger (a dealer in hides or skins, particularly sheepskins) and is listed as a principal inhabitant of Bourne*
